



Early Learning Center Re-Opened and Blessed

Sarasota – After four months of renovation and a change in curriculum, St. Martha's Early Learning Center re-opened on January 5. The program offers needy families affordable early childhood education. Located in two historic buildings, the Center has served the community for more than 20 years.

The re-vitalized program serves children ages 3 to 5. "The Center focuses on a hands-on curriculum with active learning," said Julie Zurgable, program director. The education is faith-based to provide for the children's spiritual growth.

The renovation required upgrades to the buildings—floor refurbishing, plumbing work and

painting inside and out. A major clean up followed.

Last October nine students from Cardinal Mooney High School and Sarasota High arrived at the Learning Center

for "Kids Helping Kids Day." For four hours they cleaned toys, scrubbed chairs, sorted books and cleaned the playground and storage shed. Their rewards were a visit from Bishop Frank Dewane, pizza for lunch and community service hours.

On February 17 Bishop Dewane blessed the two



buildings of St. Martha's Early Learning Center. An Open House followed.

After School Tutoring at the Haitian Center

Fort Myers – In September the Haitian Center moved to a new location at 5597 Sunrise Drive, directly across the street from Bishop Verot High School (BVHS). With more office space at the Center and the use of the BVHS library, the After School Tutoring program now assists as many as 25 students each afternoon. The students' grade levels range from first to fifth grades.

This program is important because these young children complete their homework and have assistance when it is needed. They do not go home to an empty apartment after school and watch television while their

A Day of Caring

Fort Myers – In 1991 a group of neighbors from the Eagle Trace community in North Fort Myers decided to become volunteers after reading an article in the local newspaper. Twenty volunteers began by sorting canned goods from the annual post office food drive. The food was then delivered to the local food bank.

After several meetings the group decided to raise money for the food bank and other non-profit agencies. Other communities—Pine Lakes, Lake Fairways, The Heritage and Tara Woods—joined with Eagle Trace to form "A Day of Caring." Initially four charities were chosen as recipients, including Hispanic Services of Catholic Charities.

Naples, Venice – Throughout our Catholic Charities programs, generous individuals, families and parishes donated gifts and funds for Christmas presents for needy children. Although we do not have the space to tell all these wonderful stories, we are highlighting two examples of extraordinary generosity.

As with all our programs, Family Resource Center (FRC) of Catholic Charities in Naples experienced a large increase in requests this Christmas. Donations were down about 50 percent. St. Ann Church and School and St. William Church provided tremendous support, so that FRC could help 390 children,

120 more than last year.

St. Ann Church, which organized a clothing drive for FRC, gave clothes and shoes to 120 children. St. Ann School provided toys for 22 children, and St. William Church contributed toys for 75.

parents are still at work.

The Tutoring program is available from 3:00 -5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. First, the students eat a snack at the Haitian Center. Then. they put on their backpacks to walk single file across the street with the program coordinator, Jean Claude Sime, and the adult volunteers. destination is the BVHS library.

Next, the students sit at the rectangular library tables for four and get out their homework. The Haitian Center adult volunteers are joined by several BVHS students. These volunteer tutors help the young

children with their assignments.

"When you need something, you raise your hand," said Marguerite Point-du-Jour to the children. A Haitian adult volunteer, she has been helping for nearly a year.

Edward Wodarczyk and his wife Barbara frequently volunteer together. Wodarczyk smiled when he talked about helping the young students. "They just need love," he said. "I raised seven children and they all turned out all right, so I must have known something."

Also, the new partnership between the Haitian Center Catholic Charities and BVHS not only helps the tutored students, but the

Our Mother's House Is Growing

Venice – To accommodate the growing number of single mothers seeking help from Our Mother's House of Catholic Charities, a seven-unit apartment complex has been purchased. The acquisition expands the program capacity from 10 to 17 families. Two of the seven new apartments already have been renovated and have mothers and their children living in them.

"We are turning qualified people down because we do not have the space," said Joyce Scott, Program Director of Our Mother's House. "Having additional apartments available is wonderful."

According to Scott, the program currently receives about 15 to 20 inquiries a month

from single mothers who are at risk of becoming homeless. "The volume of calls has increased exponentially as the economy has become more difficult," she said.

Our Mother's House provides shelter and guidance for single mothers and their children who,

> without the program, would be homeless. Residents have their own apartments. Volunteers assist with childcare while mothers are in school or working. Mothers work toward selfsufficiency while they are living at the program. All are required to attend life skills classes such as parenting, selfesteem, nutrition and

budgeting.

The new apartments are in walking distance of the existing facility, so residents can use the childcare center and playground. A media center/meeting room will be available in the new facility.

Grants are being sought to cover the costs of renovating the five remaining apartments. Donations also are being accepted.

"Without the help of our donors, volunteers and the community, we could not provide the support and education our mothers need to attain self-sufficiency," said Scott.


